

Advocacy rule #1: Seize the Opportunity







Key messages

- 1. All forms of asbestos cause cancer.
- 2. Howard Willems died because he was unknowingly exposed to asbestos on the job.
- 3. A mandatory public registry will reduce the risk of exposure and save lives.






Secondary messages

- 1. Asbestos is the leading cause of industrial cancers and death in Canada.
- 2. 30% of worker deaths in SK asbestos related
- 3. More than 4200 workers in SK have been exposed to asbestos.
- 4. Everyone has the right to know if their workplace, school, daycare of nursing home is safe.







Howard Willems died of cancer caused by exposure to asbestos on the job. Howard fought for a public registry of buildings that contain asbestos.



Amendment to Public Health Act

Public buildings include:

- owned by Government of Saskatchewan
- Prescribed Crown Corp or RHA
- Schools defined in Education Act
- Other prescribed enclosed structures
- and post info to website
- Owner must make info available to anyone during normal business hours

So far...

- In 6 months the landing page had 3000+ views but has fallen off
- It's been promoted through people uploading info & has been a priority on the upgraded government site (Saskatchewan.ca)
- very few calls have been received based on the site but Government has had inquiries from MB & AB
- Concerns that only including government owned buildings could create false sense of security
- post-secondary or independent schools are not listed, however, several sites have been uploaded voluntarily





Next steps

- Registry first step in increasing awareness
- Saskatchewan Asbestos Advisory Committee (CCS a member)
- reviewing abatement processes and responsibilities
- Ensure employers educate workers on how to recognize and deal with asbestos containing materials
